Cobham 2 Sevenoaks Town 2

Craig Lewington's stoppage-time free-kick denied Sevenoaks Town victory in their Emirates FA Cup Extra Preliminary Round at Cobham on Saturday.

Louis Collins' double saw Oaks come from behind to lead with seven minutes left, before conceding again from a hotly disputed late free-kick.

Goalkeeper Ben Bridle-Card was adjudged to have handled outside the area, earning a booking in the melee that followed, before Lewington stepped up to keep Combined Counties League hosts in the tie having lost Jon Hood minutes earlier, sent off for two bookable offences.

Boss Micky Collins serving a one-match touchline ban, after being dismissed from the dug-out at Whitehawk last season, watched his side spurn several first half chances, new boy Max Walsh, closest to breaking the deadlock, crashing a 30-yard free-kick against the crossbar.

They paid the price four minutes after the restart, Monty Everett firing the Surrey side in front, breaking quickly down the right, before cutting inside and shooting home. Collins responded, sending on Jason Thompson and newcomer Lammin Bah, and as the weather improved, so did Oaks'

Collins timed his run perfectly to head in Reece Deakin's 65th minute corner, before stabbing home his second 18 minutes later. Deakin again the provider, Collins tapping in after keeper Lee Norman failed to hold Thompson's downward header.

The History of Cobham FC

Cobham Football Club was formed on Friday 5 November 1886 by Founding President, Hon. Alan Egerton MP and villagers connected with the local Coffee Tayern. The Vicar offered to supply it with a football. On 4 November 1890, The Evening Telegraph reported on the death of our Centre Half, Arthur Smith, following injuries sustained in a match vs Kingston Wanderers. In 1892, the Club affiliated to the Surrey FA. The home ground was never settled with various fields around the outskirts of the village being used at different times. During the late 1920's they played in the Kingston and District League winning division 1 in 1928/29 and 1929/30. Following the Club gaining intermediate status in 1933, Cobham won the Surrey Intermediate League Cup (Central) in 1933/34 and 1935/36. The Club achieved senior status in 1938 upon election to the new Surrey Senior League.

The war years between 1939 to 1945 saw a vote to agree a temporary merger with the Avorians Sports Club to form Cobham

After the War, the Club made home at Cobham recreation ground until 1955/6 when it moved to Anvil lane also known as the Leg o' Mutton field. The club took its nickname from the word anvil and thus became the Hammers. Phil Walker and Trevor Lee of Millwall FC and Cricketer Bob Willis of Surrey & England are amongst famous ex-players. . During the 70's, 80's and 90's the club had a really good local feel with the ground being a vibrant hub of football. The World Famous Rock Band, Moody Blues, played an Annual Charity Match at Cobham Football Club, giving us our record attendance of 2,000 in 1974/75. The floodlights were installed in season 1996/97 and were christened with a game against Conference side Woking FC on 18th February 1997.

The Hammers were founder members of the Combined Counties League moving up from the now defunct Surrey Senior League. They finished second to Ash United in 1998/9. Amongst long serving stalwarts such as Dave Tippetts who first joined the club in the 1980's, the pride of place on the clubhouse wall goes to a painting

of Reg Madgwick, who served as player, committee member and fund raiser. When he died in 1995, he requested his ashes be scattered on the pitch and left all his worldly possessions to the club and the decision was made to rename the around The Reg Madgwick Stadium in his honour. The Club won the Combined Counties Premier League Challenge Cup in 2001/02 beating Bedfont FC 3-2. After the stand went up in 2004, the club was a mainstay in the Combined Counties Division 1 under the overall auidance until 2015 of the late Ken Reed who died in 2018.

After a new committee was elected in 2015, the club has built its Junior football with 16 sides to compliment the men's team and the new seated stand, new fencing and the dual turnstile were put in during April 2016 to allow the ground to achieve a Grade D (Step 4) rating.

2017/2018 saw the club promoted to the Combined Counties Premier Division under the guidance of Sam Merison and the Avorians to ensure local football continued. Introduction of an Under 23 side to support the first team.in august 2019 the club was awarded the status of FA Charter Standard Club. During the covid years, Cobham enjoyed record cup runs in the FA Cup (1st qualifying round) and last 16 of the FA Vase in 2020/21. The club most recent trophies are the unique weekend double achieved by Pete Doherty's Under 23's -winning the Surrey Elite Intermediate League's Reserve Division Covid Cup & Challenge Cup in 2021 beating Frimley Green

> Under 23's & Virginia Water Reserves both on penalties. This adds to their 2019 triumph over SCR FC under 23's also on penalties to win the Combined Counties Development League Cup. With many of the town's businesses now on board as sponsors and suppliers, the Hammers are on a firm footing for progression. Committee Stalwarts such as Ewemade Orobator and Mark Cornish have helped to grow the club and gain many of the town's businesses on board as sponsors and suppliers, the Hammers are on a firm footing for progression with the town and families at the heart of our plans.

Fingers crossed for 'normal'

So, here we go again! The 2021-22 season is almost upon us – for some it's already underway.

Most of Step 5 and 6 started from July 31 – July! – while this weekend (August 7) the FA Cup gets started with the Extra Preliminary Round, only nine months before the final on May 14.

For many, competitive football makes a welcome return after an enforced break from the game due to the pandemic.

At NLP HQ we have everything crossed for a 'normal' season, Covid has taken its toll on us too, but we'd like to thank our loyal readers for helping us to keep producing the paper every Sunday. We've not missed one weekend since the pandemic began or indeed for the last 21 years!

The previous 18 months in Non-League has been tough to say the least for all involved. The 2019-20 and the 2020-21 seasons proved fruitless for many although the FA's restructure did at least provide some upward movement for clubs at Steps 4-6.

Step 3 can rightly feel hard done by having been stagnant throughout this time.

It's why the FA's Alliance Committee has been formulating contingency plans, with the feedback of clubs, to try and prevent any more 'null and void' seasons.

There are three approaches to the contingency plans:

Approach 1 – if the season successfully starts between August 14, 2021 and October 31, 2021, but it becomes clear that a division cannot complete 100 per cent of its fixtures, league tables would still be finalised providing the division

has completed at least 75 per cent of its fixtures. Final league standings would be determined by using unweighted points per game and promotion and relegation would take place based on those standings.

Approach 2 – if the 2021–22 season cannot commence on or before October 31, an alternate competition would be implemented, with several potential formats under consideration determining promotion and relegation.

Approach 3 – if there is insufficient time for the regular season to achieve 75 per cent of fixtures, or an alternate competition to be completed, a supplementary competition would utilise results from completed fixtures in the 2021–22 season to avoid clubs playing opponents more than twice and ensure there is sufficient data to determine league standings.

The objective is to ensure promotion/ relegation but, of course, this cannot be guaranteed. Who knows which way the pandemic will turn next. Such was the extent of the disruption last season, any number of contingency plans wouldn't have prevented the curtailment of Steps 3-6.

Hopefully, these plans will never see the light of day, but at least they are there if needed.

Eventually, we will have all stopped talking about Covid! Until then, we wish you a safe return to football and a successful season following your team. One thing is for sure, win or lose, we must cherish standing on the terraces at 3pm on a Saturday!

Sevenoaks Town 3 Canterbury City 1

Louis Collins scored twice as Sevenoaks Town made a winning start to pre-season on

All the goals came inside the opening 25 minutes, with Collins Jnr netting either side of Teddy Nelson's equaliser, before Kyle De Silva added the third.

Oaks were forced to postpone their opening fixture against Cray Wanderers due to a an Oaks player testing Covid-19 positive.

Boss Micky Collins named a 20-man squad.

Bradley Schafer returned following a lengthy lay off due to injury, as well as goalkeeper Ben Bridle-Card, Stefan Wright, Dean Gunner, Kyle De Silva, Hayden Skerry, Reece Deakin, Charlie Holmes and Ryan Fowler, who all featured last season. The Oaks boss also included four of the club's under-18s, including 16-year-old central defender Stan Kenny who set-up Collins' second, as well as several trialists. Back at his old club after being released by National League Dover, Collins, looked sharp, putting the hosts in front after only three minutes, with a smart finish following Danny Divine's swift break down the right. Centre back Nelson headed City level six minutes later, unchallenged from a corner, after Bridle-Card blocked Sam Lawford's close-range effort.

Collins got his second, running onto Kenny's thorough ball, before netting with a low angled drive into the far corner. Youngster Sam Harris and ex-Whyteleafe man Ryan Atkinson combined well down the left for De Silva's third.

Collins missed out on a third, skying his effort over the bar 10 minutes before half-

time

Gunner headed against a post three minutes after the break, City also hitting the woodwork later - also missing out on an open goal from the rebound.

Sevenoaks Town 2 Brentwood Town 4

Ryan Fowler and Ryan Atkinson scored first and last in this pre-season run-out against Brentwood Town on a sweltering afternoon.

The Isthmian League Division 1 North side answered a late SOS to fill the gap left by original opponents Erith & Belvedere, who pulled out the day before after one of their squad proved Covid-19 positive.

Once again Micky Collins fielded a mixture of first team, youngsters and trialists - against the Essex club's mix of first team and Under-23s, after their own game against Tilbury had also been called off late.

They made a strong start going close twice in the opening stages - with stand-in home keeper Jim Town blocking another close-range effort.

Fowler made the breakthrough after 15 minutes finishing well from Hayden Skerry's set-up.

Brentwood immediately hit the woodwork before levelling things up - Town unlucky, blocking the first effort, only to be beaten by a deflected finish.

A swift break put Brentwood in front before adding a third just before half-time.

Oaks made a positive start to the second half, Kyle De Silva's effort was blocked, before Louis Collins missed out with a far post header, coming off worse after colliding with the perimeter fencing.

Brentwood added a fourth from the spot, Town denied them again, before second half substitute Atkinson got Oaks late second.

Sevenoaks Town 2 Lewes 4

Elliott Duncan scored his first senior goal in a hugely entertaining midweek run-out. Oaks trailed 2-0 at one stage, before Duncan, Under-18 top scorer in the club's Kent Youth League's title winning side, and Dean Gunner struck either side of half-time to level things up, before Lewes scored twice late on to clinch victory.

The East Sussex visitors under new boss Tony Russell following his switch from Cray Wanderers made a fast start, going in front after 11 minutes from a free -kick before Charlie Holmes headed another effort off the line.

Bradley Schafer and Louis Collins went close, before Lewes doubled their lead as Oaks conceded a second from another set-piece.

Duncan pulled one back a minute later before Joe Tennent and Gunner both saw late first half efforts clawed away by the busy Lewes keeper.

Oaks started the second half on the frontfoot, Kyle De Silva going close before setting -up Gunner to make it 2-2. Lewes went in front again with the best goal of the night, 15 minutes from time before adding a fourth late on.

Sevenoaks Town 4 Hollands & Blair 1

Bradley Schafer continued his return from a long injury lay-off by featuring among the scorers as Sevenoaks Town continued their pre-season build-up with a 4-1 win over Hollands & Blair

Schafer out since New Years Day last year came off the bench to rifle home the final goal and cap a strong second half home display.

Joe Tennent put Oaks ahead after eight minutes, converting Stefan Wright's long throw.

Blair journeyman Luke Harvey headed wide from a free-kick before new defender Emmanuel Dasho's last ditch far post challenge denied the Southern Counties East Leaguers a late equaliser a minute before half-time.

Oaks upped their game in the second half - Hayden Skerry set-up Louis Collins to blast home the second of the underside of the bar five minutes in.

Wright punished a defensive slip-up three minutes later, before Blair immediately pulled one back.

Schafer, one of several second half substitutes powered home the fourth with 15 minutes left.

Sevenoaks Town 1 Tonbridge Angels 0

Louis Collins hit his fourth goal in five games as Sevenoaks Town claimed a notable pre-season scalp. Collins struck seven minutes after the break, earning himself an early 20th birthday present, seizing upon a poor back pass, then winning the race to the ball with Angels goalkeeper Jon Hendy, before joyfully tucking the ball inside the near post.

He was inches away from getting a second 13 minutes from time, chesting down a perfect through ball, only to stab the ball wide of the far post.

Newcomer Max Walsh fired just wide midway through the first half and went close again soon afterwards

Angels enjoyed plenty of possession without really testing goalkeeper Ben Bridle-Card.

However the Oaks stopper endured a painful end to the night, suffering a blow to the face in a collision, which forced him off late in the game.

Sevenoaks Town 3 South Park 0

Sevenoaks Town boss Micky Collins hailed this win as the perfect way to wrap up Sevenoaks Town's pre-season preparations.

Bradley Schafer's first half double and a third for new midfielder Max Walsh capped a good afternoon.

A torrential thunderstorm soon after the start, and several injury stoppages affected both sides, with Schafer treated for a kick in the mouth before getting Oaks up and running.

He put them in front after 11 minutes and doubled the lead six minutes before half-time, with Hayden Skerry seeing another effort saved.

Louis Collins was inches away from a third soon after the break - just failing to get on the end of Reece Deacon's cross, following good work by another new-boy, defender Danny Divine.

Oaks keeper Ben Bridle-Card denied South Park, tipping a close range effort against a post, while Joe Tennent and Walsh both had shots blocked. Walsh introduced at half-time added the third just after the hour with a fine finish his first for the club.

Collins confirmed his signing having impressed on pre-season, together with defender Emmanuel Dasho.

Sevenoaks Town FC



History: Sevenoaks Town were originally formed in 1883, one of the founding members of the Kent League.

In April the same year, the club played Royal Arsenal, then the only professional club in the South East of England in front of around 1000 spectators at Knole Paddock.

They combined with St Johns United in 1951, and joined the Western section of the Kent Amateur League.

Division 1 League Cup winners in 1965–66, they were twice winners of the Premier Division in 1968–69 and 1975–76.

They won the Kent County League - three times - 1984-85, 1995-96 and 2002-3.

The club were Kent Intermediate Challenge Shield and Inter-Regional Challenge Cup winners twice, and lifted the Sevenoaks Charity Cup on 12 occasions.

STFC COVID-19 Policy Statement

The entire team at Sevenoaks Football Club are committed to providing a safe football environment.

COVID-19 RestrictionsIn accordance with the current Government guidelines and The FA guidelines, individuals can play match football and carry out competitive training with additional control measures in place. All of the well-publicised Government social distancing and hygiene requirements must be fully observed in and around the match and training pitches and parking areas at all times.

At the Bourne Stadium, anyone entering will be subject to a machine temperature check with anyone failing this check refused entry on safety grounds. In addition, there will be no access to the changing rooms except where league guidance requires it for matches or for safeguarding purposes. We have provided player/parent guidance and we are constantly receiving updates from The FA and Government which we will ensure to update our control measures when any further changes can be made. The measures that have been put in place are for you, your family and everyone else's safety.

- An individual is required to self-assess before travelling to a match/training and if showing any symptoms of the virus or has been in contact with someone displaying symptoms within the last two weeks, then they should stay at home and call 111. They should remain isolated until it is safe to return.
- We will be complying with additional control measure when carrying out match play and training with social distancing measures before, during breaks and after match play/training. Please respect each other and any decisions that are made on behalf of the club for safety reasons.
- For training, a maximum number of people are allowed into the designated training area within the red zone at any one time in order for social distancing to take place when contact training is not taking place.
 STFC and their coaches will abide by this maximum number as provided by The FA.

- All training activities are undertaken entirely at your own risk and parents/players must sign up to participate in footballing activity along with signing up to The FA's 'Code of Behaviour'.
- All players and attendees to training and matches are required to provide contact information to enable STFC to support the NHS Track and Trace program and all information provided will be covered under the club's Data Protection Policy.
- Players/parents/officials should arrive at the designated match/training time as entrance to the pitch will not be permitted before this time.
- All parents not remaining pitch side will be asked to drop and collect their children at the allotted time from the edge of the pitch or if at the Bourne Stadium from outside the around exit.
- Players should bring to training with them, named hand gel bottle and named water bottle as well as naming any other item they bring such as sun cream, medication, etc, for their own personal use.
- All training equipment will be appropriately sanitised including football equipment such as footballs, cones, goal posts and any other training equipment being used.
- At the Bourne Stadium, all signage for social distancing is installed in the ground to remind everyone of social distancing with volunteers to provide continued guidance.
- At the Bourne Stadium, the entrance and exit touch points, along with other areas at the ground will be sanitised with a cleaning sanitiser which continues to work for up to 30 days after it has been applied.
- Periodic touchpoint testing will take place to measure levels of microbes present on surfaces at the Bourne Stadium to ensure the sanitising program in place is effective. We look forward to welcoming you back to the club.

Paul will take on and oversee STFC's Women and Girls' section, and he will also manage the Women's First

Team for the upcoming 21/22 season supported by Maddie Smith and Dan Thomas who bring a wealth of experience and have been instrumental in our progress so far.

We at Sevenoaks Town FC are confident that with the addition of Natalie, Charlotte and Paul to STFC's Women and Girls' section, as well as

the foundation we have built since our first girls' team in 2012, we will be able to really push on and increase the profile and exposure of women's football at the cub. The ultimate aim is to have our women's and men's teams run in the same way and be on the same level, and we hope to achieve this starting with the three-year plan which is being put in place.
